San Jacinto Monument



The San Jacinto Monument is a 567-foot-high column located on the Houston Ship Channel. The monument is topped with a 220-ton star that commemorates the site of the Battle of San Jacinto, the decisive battle of the Texas Revolution. The freedom of Texas from Mexico won here led to annexation and to the Mexican–American War, resulting in the acquisition by the United States of the states of Texas and nine other states.



David Crockett was an American folk hero, frontiersman, soldier, and politician. He is commonly referred as the "King of the Wild Frontier." After representing Tennessee in the U.S. House of Representatives, he took part in the Texas Revolution and was killed at the Battle of the Alamo.

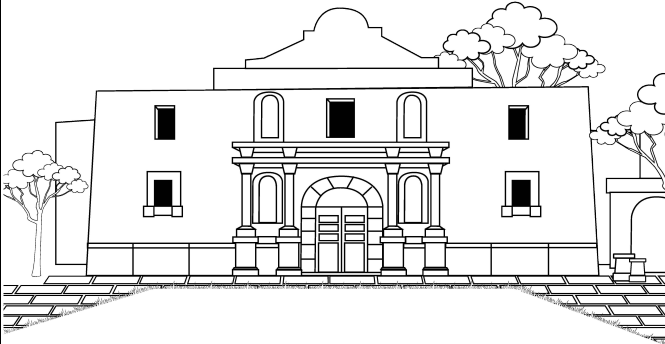

Historical Places: Alamo

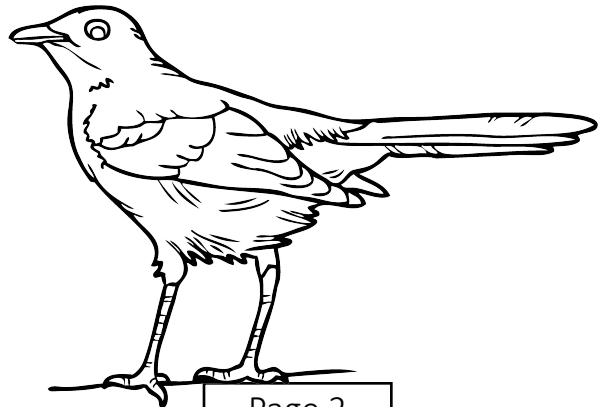

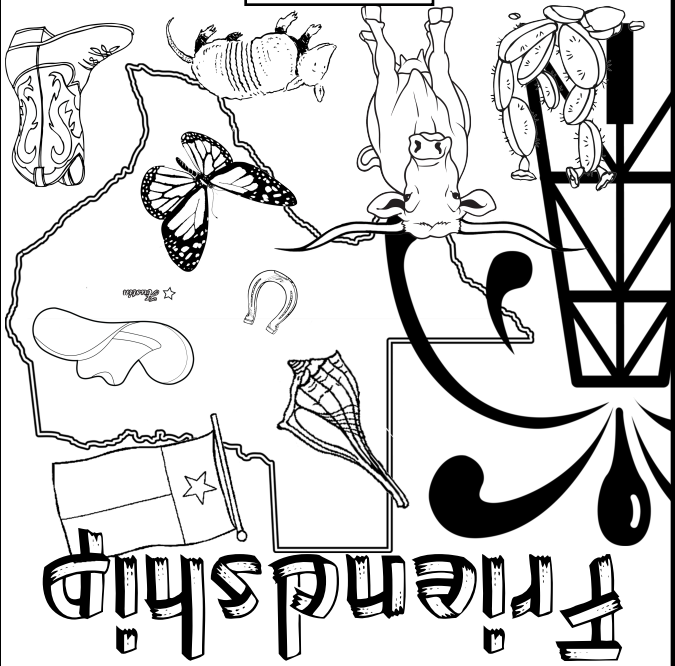


The Alamo (near San Antonio) was a mission and fortress. The **Battle of the Alamo** was a pivotal event in the Texas Revolution. Following a 13-day siege, Mexican troops under President General Santa Anna reclaimed the Alamo Mission, killing the Texian and immigrant occupiers. Santa Anna's cruelty during the battle inspired many Texans, both legal Texas settlers and illegal immigrants from the United States, to join the Texian Army. Buoyed by a desire for revenge, the Texans defeated the Mexican Army at the Battle of San Jacinto, on April 21, 1836, ending the rebellion.

State Bird: Mockingbird

The mockingbird has the prettiest song of any bird native to North America. That's perhaps the chief reason the "mocker" was adopted as the **state bird of Texas** in 1927. The song of the mockingbird is, in fact, a medley of the calls of many other birds. Each imitation is repeated two or three times, then another song is started, all in rapid succession. It is common for an individual bird to have as many as 25-30 songs in its repertory. The mockingbird is also known as a fierce protector of its nest and environment. It is about ten inches in length, including its relatively long tail. It has a light gray coat and a whitish underside. Its wings and tail are darker gray with white patches.





The word **Friendship** was adopted as the Texas state motto by the Texas Legislature in February 1930. The word was probably chosen because the name Texas or Tejas was the Spanish pronunciation of a Caddo Indian word sometimes translated to mean "friends" or "allies."

State Motto

State Flower: Bluebonnet

Named for its color and, it is said, the resemblance of its petal to a woman's sunbonnet, the bluebonnet is the state flower of Texas. It blooms in the early spring and can be readily found in fields and along the roadsides throughout central and south Texas. It was adopted as the official state flower by the Texas Legislature in 1901.
